

CAMP RULES FOR SPRING FAMILY 2026

- BSA Youth Protection Guidelines apply in camp! **ALL Leaders MUST have current SafeGuarding Youth training. All ADULTS are encouraged to have SAFEGUARDING YOUTH protection certification. Your unit may require this.**
 - Any adult staying overnight that is NOT a legal guardian of an attending cub scout MUST be a BSA registered adult leader with current SYT.
 - SYT certificates copies should be brought to camp. Keep a copy with med form for each leader.
 - All adults must review the "[How to Protect your Children from Child Abuse: A Parent's Guide](#)" that can be found in the front of each Cub Scout Handbook.
 - All adults must be accompanied by a registered leader at any time they are with youth members other than their own child/ward.
 - Families should be walking with their unit leaders, as a group, throughout the weekend. Two registered adult leaders preferred and is per the Guide to Safe Scouting.
 - Bathrooms and showers are designed for one person at a time. Adults do **not** need to accompany an elementary-school-and-older aged youth into a bathroom or shower.
 - Youth should walk with another youth buddy.
- Camp is operated according to the **Guide to Safe Scouting** and **Youth Protection Training**. Any violation of these guidelines must be reported to the Camp Director. Unit Leaders and Adults are required to always follow these guidelines.
- **HEALTH AND MEDICAL CONCERNS**
 - **Feeling ill? Please don't attend camp.** The Camp Health Officer will have the final word regarding attendance and health concerns at camp.
 - **No smoking or vaping in any buildings or in the presence of youth.** There is a designated smoking area behind the Trading Post building where there is a butt can.
 - **No illegal drugs or alcoholic beverages are allowed.** Drug laws will be strictly enforced according to the criminal code of the State of Georgia. Alcohol use is strictly prohibited on Northeast Georgia Council BSA property.
 - No improper or unauthorized possession or use of any medication in camp.
 - BSA Medical Forms (A&B) are required for every person. All adults. All Youth. These will be collected by a designated unit leader, reviewed at Friday leader meeting or check-in.
- **CHECK IN & CHECK OUT, AND PARKING**
 - Every family must check-in and out with admin. Individual camp staff (sans cubs) are also required to check-in. All persons at camp will be issued a colored wrist band for the event.
 - Units Leaders are expected to submit a unit roster, checked off for Med Forms, and SYT Certifications by the Friday leader's meeting. Med Forms for all persons should also be submitted that time.
 - All cars remain in the parking lots except service and admin vehicles that received a pass from Admin.
 - Anyone requesting handicapped parking should show their government issued handicapped parking pass, so that a temporary camp pass may also be issued, and the locations of the handicapped parking spaces.
 - **Anyone leaving camp at any time must sign-out in the camp office.**
 - For Sunday departure, unit leaders should be the last one from their unit leaving the campsite.
- **SAFETY FIRST! BE PREPARED. BE ATTENTIVE. BE MINDFUL.**
 - Be attentive. Camp is set in nature. Terrain maybe rocky, full of holes and ruts, with possibly tree roots and stumps. Closed-toe, athletic footwear works best.
 - **Be prepared. For weather.** For insects. For plants. For wildlife.
 - No rock throwing of any kind.
 - **No fix-blade sheath knives allowed.**
 - **No firearms** or any kind of ammunition may be on property or in the possession of any Scout or Adult. Firearms and bows used at camp are available at camp ranges only. No personal firearms or bows are allowed.
 - **No fireworks** of any kind allowed in camp.
 - **No pets** or other animals permitted except certified guide dogs.
 - Adults, even if not registered leaders, should be models of good behavior. Youth take their cues from adults.
- **CAMPSITE SAFETY**
 - No aerosol cans.
 - All white gas lanterns, propane lanterns, stoves, etc. are to be filled and stored **ONLY** by Adults. Fuel must be secured and locked away.
 - No fires or open flames allowed in tents, Adirondacks, cabins, or any other structure at camp. Never use camp stoves or combustion heaters in tents! This practice could be fatal!
 - Campfire rings are located in each campsite. Please do not make new Campfire Rings. Adults may use personal camp stoves for cooking - BSA policy on the use of fuels must be followed.
 - Don't store food in your tent - it attracts all kinds of unwelcome pests.
 - Food should be transported, stored and prepared appropriately. There are no refrigerators or freezers available.
- **All attendees are to always behave in accordance with the Scout Oath and Law.** Individuals who violate this rule are subject to review by their Adults and/or Leaders and Camp Staff. Any person who violates the rules or laws or endangers anyone may be asked to leave the camp immediately. It is the responsibility of the Units' Leaders and Adults to remove the Scout (including cub scout) and/or Adult from camp within a designated time decided by the Camp Admin Staff. If a Scout, including a cub scout, Leader or Adult is dismissed from camp, no refund will be provided.
